Part C – *Our Community's Initial Thoughts and Ideas about the Future* – where your parish community is asked to provide its first thoughts about how it might move forward.

Ultimately, we would like all parishes to provide their final responses using an on-line questionnaire as this will allow us to collate and analyse responses efficiently – and we will be providing information later in the year about how to do this. However, while drafting and sharing your responses within the parish, you may find that the electronic version of the questionnaire proves to be the best way of recording and storing your responses. Gross income increased by 24% between 2006 and 2015. This reduces to 19% if the £2000 donation is excluded.

An increase in offertories from £28,210 in 2006 to £37,828 in 2015. This includes an increase in weekly offertories from £5.17 in 2016 to £7.13 per head. Since the current Priest-in-Charge, Fr Richard Rowe, succeeded Fr John Timmins, who passed away a few years ago, the parish has moved from formerly needing to use parish income to support the Parish Priest (Fr John) to, albeit temporarily, currently not needing to do so with the current Priest-in-Charge (Fr Richard) situation.

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

Part B - Reflective Questions

When Jesus was walking by the Sea of Galilee and called his first disciples (Mt 4:18), they must not have had a clue what they were getting into. Four fishermen became 'apprentices' to an itinerant leader, teacher and healer, overnight. In Mark's Gospel (Mk 1:21) the first thing they did was to accompany Jesus into the Synagogue in Capernaum, where he proceeded to break the Jewish law by healing a possessed man on the Sabbath.

There is something exciting about being a disciple, an 'apprentice' of Jesus. There is so much to learn and discover. Jesus walked around the countryside with his followers, both women and men; they were a community, a community on the move. The disciples were formed and shaped within this community.

Once Jesus died and rose from the dead, the disciples were terrified. They ran away (to Emmaus) or hid in an upper room or reverted to their previous job – seven of them went back fishing. Time after time Jesus came among them and reassured them. They were totally taken over by the Holy Spirit and began their work as missionaries; they are instructed to go out into the world and proclaim the Gospel.

We live in a very different world today. But as a result of our Baptism, we are called, gifted and sent. We too are sent into the world. We are missionaries within our local population, disciples among all the residents in our neighbourhood.

The local priest looks after the flock. We are immersed in the world; and we engage with each other, with those hurt by the Church, those separated from the Church for whatever reason and those beyond the institution of the Church. Every one of us has a particular pathway of discipleship to follow, and many of us discover it through the communities within which we live. It is only right that we pray for more men to respond to the call of God to become ordained priests. It is also true that we all need to explore how God is calling us to make a difference in the world we live in. This calling (or vocation) may be to marriage, parenthood, the single life, nursing, policing... God has an infinite imagination; there is a unique calling for each one of us. We become disciples when we learn to look at our world through the eyes of Jesus.

This questionnaire will help us to look at our community and discover how it can help each and every one of us become an apprentice of Jesus.

We have heard the facts and figures, the prospect of having 50 priests in our Diocese in 2030, the need for a wider variety of leadership in the Church and the very basic need to become more open to the guidance of the Holy Spirit who is leading us into the future.

Pope Francis gives us clear guidance when he says in *Evangelii Gaudium* (para 20):



"Each Christian and community every must discern the path that the Lord points out, but all of us are asked to obey his call to go forth our from own comfort zone in order to reach all the 'peripheries' in need of the light of the Gospel".

With this call in mind, let us begin to explore the questions before us.

1 The Christian Faithful

The Christian Faithful are the heart of every worshiping community. If it is to flourish, a community needs a core of members who are committed to the Gospel of Christ and are willing to make the community a priority, giving generously of their time, imagination, gifts and other resources. A viable parish needs a healthy number of active members.

a) How can your community look to sustain and increase the number of people worshipping with you towards 2030?

• With the aim of showing others by way of example in the way we live, that the Church's teaching is relevant to our everyday lives and concerns about others, we should be more welcoming to all (including single parents, divorced and disaffected people), presenting a more dynamic and outgoing image and specifically:

• Advertise social events, prayer groups and parish news in local press* and in village booklets (a monthly regular column similar to the Anglican Church?), social media (Facebook), websites and ensure clear, bright, welcoming signage to indicate the location of the churches from the main road

• Prepare an introductory booklet about the 2 churches including: contact details of the priest, parish council members and all regular volunteers and gift aid information as well as a history of the churches and services available, especially highlighting the family Mass in Great Bardfield on Sundays

• Offer regular educational and or social events (summer BBQ or winter meal or quiz) for families as well as adults with an ecumenical Christian ethos to the local community: 'Messy Church' activities; coffee mornings for OAPs or young mums and babies, youth groups, book sales, art sales with refreshments, clubs, prayer, discussion and bible groups

• Hold more youth orientated Masses

• Strengthen each individual's Catholic roots by providing study groups for adults - better understanding of our faith would encourage more willingness

- Give the younger (parents rather than grandparents) generation a say
- Persuade each generation to respect the different opinions of each other
- · Create a stronger network for young teenagers
- Increase the availability of exposition of the Blessed Sacrament and Confession

• Become more involved in feast and festival community events (eg S.W Carnival or similar to the Spirit of Christmas Concert)

• Engage with Brentwood Religious Education Service, flagging its success at bringing families into church

• Invite those who no longer attend Mass to attend with reassurances that they would be made welcome.

- To put the above into action and to raise the profile of the church form a social and other committees to implement each idea. One parishioner has suggested that in order to provide improved services within the framework of the existing church buildings, they should be re-equipped to be virtually connected through a website and have streaming for access to prayer resources online as well as better communication between all the parishioners.
- An alternative view from two parishioners was to close down the two churches and to build one new purpose-built building to support Thaxted, Bardfield and the surrounding villages. A new place of worship should be multifunctional with an area that could be used and hired out for functions, host youth groups, retreats whilst a part of the church could be sectioned off and kept sacred. If the church was more appealing and useable, it would be a lot easier to invite people to attend church and functions. (Funding costs to be raised from the sale of existing buildings although elsewhere, one parishioner has referred to ownership of the Thaxted building reverting to a family if the current use as a Catholic church was to end).
- A third idea from a parishioner was to create a "North Essex Super-Parish" made up of the parishes of Saffron Walden, Thaxted, Great Dunmow, Great Bardfield. The churches in those towns and villages could be sold together with St Thomas More School and a new out of town site, strategically located and equipped with all state of the art amenities, facilities and parking etc could be built including a new school. With a greater critical mass of parishioners, it would then be possible to run a wider variety of mainstream parish groups (sacramental preparation, prayer groups, youth groups, elderly visits) with a pooling of resources and efficient management of people to take on these volunteer roles. (Funding for this idea would also be from the sale of the existing buildings).

2 Leadership

It is certain that in the future even more communities will be sharing a priest with other worshipping communities. Priests and deacons will be working more collaboratively with people. The prospect of having around 50 active priests in our Diocese in 15 years' time (2030) certainly sharpens the mind. While we must continue to pray that men will respond to the call of discipleship as ordained priests and deacons, we also need to look carefully at the development of other forms of leadership in the Church.

a) What lay leadership is currently viable and effective in your community?

The current lay leadership is mostly organised by the "same dedicated band of parishioners" (special mention of the Parish Council needing new members and one person expressed sadness that there were no new volunteers) covering:

- Eucharistic Ministers
- First Communion Teachers (thorough teaching is highly commended)
- Children's Liturgy
- Altar servers (children and adults)
- Parish Council
- Stewards of the Gospel
- Diocesan Strategic Planning Group
- Ginger Group
- Some social activities (coffee mornings)
- Choir and music
- Flower and cleaning rotas
- Readers

b) For what other areas of your community life could trained lay men and women assume responsibility?

• Several parishioners mentioned that new volunteers should be encouraged to come forward and take on the existing and new roles and training could be provided for future Stewards of the Gospel and other lay leaders to take on roles that the shortage of priests will necessitate.

• It was noted that there are also some parishioners who contribute willingly when they asked.

• One parishioner feels that whilst there are a number of talented and willing parishioners covering a range of mixed skills and interests, the parish lacks vision and a plan and suffers in some cases from introspection.

• If a vision and a plan could be agreed by all, its implementation would be more than achievable given the resources available in the parish.

3 Active Involvement of People

In parishes where the same small, ageing group of parishioners has served the community extremely well over very many years, there may be some real anxiety about the future. As that small group retires and withdraws from active involvement, the community is at risk of floundering if younger parishioners are unable or unwilling to take their place.

a) How diverse and active are parishioners within the community?

• Parishioners reflect the parish's inhabitants in terms of diversity (many age ranges from 1+, one person from Philippines and one from Malaysia whilst in Thaxted, most are older parishioners and younger families go to Great Bardfield)

• A good proportion of parishioners are active (important not to "nag people to get involved" but "hidden resources" may not yet have been tapped!)

• Some parishioners are also active as volunteers in other charities helping the homeless, elderly and severely disabled, singing in choirs, attending Lenten courses and holding Lenten Suppers in parishioner's homes, mentoring young people and fund raising for various groups;

b) How can the parish community invite and prepare more people to support it?

• More parishioners could volunteer and different parishioners could be 'invited' to join in and take on new roles

• Practical expertise has been very willing and forthcoming (kitchen refurbishment and clearing of the flat and the 5- year maintenance review)

• Existing active parishioners could be more welcoming to new volunteers (although some parishioners who have recently joined the church in Great Bardfield feel they have been made very welcome)

4 Worship and Spiritual Life

A flourishing community has worship at the centre of its life. The ultimate goal is to make Jesus Christ known and loved. This is why Jesus Christ is at the heart of every worshipping community. The Eucharist is the principal means in which we celebrate this. The Holy Spirit may well be leading us to discover a variety of forms of worship and devotion in the future. For this very reason a living community makes every effort to encourage parishioners of all ages and backgrounds to participate fully in prayer, devotion, worship and study.

God loves us individually. We respond to God's love in our own ways. When we come together for worship we all need to have a sense that our relationship with God is strengthened and affirmed.

a) Are there aspects of your community's regular worship together at Mass that are working particularly well and deepen the spiritual life of those present?

• Music and enthusiastic singing adds joy to the shared celebration (one person wondered if psalms could be sung on special occasions only to reduce the length of the Mass described as 50% longer than the standard 45 mins!)

• Fr Richard's homilies and talks with children help to deepen spirituality

• Children's Liturgy and special children's Mass for Christ the King support parents "continuing the faith to the next generation" and the absence of the children during part of the Mass allows parents to have a period of quiet prayer

- Servers and readers at Mass
- Sunday and weekday Masses
- Fellowship at coffee mornings allows us to get to know each other better
- Food Bank helps to think of those without
- Mission Boxes and Christmas shoe boxes; and Communion to the sick

• A parishioner from Thaxted noted that the success of the children's liturgy in Great Bardfield drew young families away from Thaxted and as a result services at Thaxted were rather more low key

b) Is there anything your community can do to encourage a deeper prayer life and engagement with Scripture?

• Discussion (ie abortion, divorce, marriage, confession, racism, hypocrisy and homophobia from a biblical perspective) and prayer groups (in the homes of parishioners?)

- Penitential services
- Veneration of the Blessed Sacrament on a regular basis
- Healing Masses

• Invite speakers from other parishes and religious organisations to share their spiritual development

• One parishioner believes that larger parishioner numbers would be needed to plan, organise and arrange prayer events outside of Sunday Mass

• Another parishioner believes that a better well heated parish building would be more conducive to attending retreats or discussion groups!

5 Education and Continuing Formation

A flourishing community will be able to show that the Catholic faith is handed on to children, young people and adults by means of regular programmes of religious education and Christian Formation.

a) What good experiences has your community had in the past and what opportunities would you like to see for 'continuing formation' in the faith for members of your community?

- Continuing leadership from the parish priest
- Confirmation preparation for young people

b) How can closer relationships be developed between the worshipping community, the school(s) the young people attend, and the families that belong to both?

• Better communication of youth Masses to schools and school Masses at our church (new format of our newsletter to incorporate more information to advertise these) and links between the school and church's website to share diary of events

• Priests who say Mass at Catholic schools could be invited to our church and Fr Richard could offer to take assembly at schools

• Schools could invite families from our parish to join in the penitential services held during Advent for school children; Representatives from schools could be invited to speak about their work and for social functions and school children could be invited to prepare a special Mass at our church

• Our trained altar servers and readers could go to schools to teach the others in school and encourage other children to want to go to church

• Children in the parish who attend schools with Virtual Learning Environments could show classmates what they are doing in their churches

• In our website we could include a page dedicated to children and their achievements including a gallery of pictures

• Children's choir or competition between parishes and schools?

• Catholic participation in local cubs and brownie groups, mother & toddler groups & youth club

• "Twinning" with a church in inner London for instance or another church with a very different demographic, to increase horizons and engage more interest of children and adults

• Thaxted church loses their young children after First Holy Communion children move to Great Bardfield regrettably - could they be invited back to Thaxted for a monthly youth Mass?

• A 'travelling exhibition based on the children's RE topic at school to be circulated among the local parishes" perhaps following a dedicated week on a school project making links with the parish

"Messy Church"

• Trips to Walsingham or the beach for both school and parish children and families in the catchment and in all the parishes within the catchment area

• Creation of a new (Super-Parish) school and church in a new location

• Family and school joint events in our church gardens

• Have the older children been asked to complete a questionnaire (a simplified version) as they are our future?

6 Outreach

A flourishing community extends a spirit of hospitality and invites people to become members. It also looks way beyond itself to discover how the spirit of Jesus can be brought to bear on everything that concerns us in the world: our relationship with other Christian Churches, women and men of other faiths and all men and women of good will in our world. Under this heading we include: hospitality; Ecumenism; Interfaith relationships; involvement in local social and political issues and much more. It explores the practical ways we have of becoming 'missionary disciples'.

a) What good experiences has your community had regarding our call to be involved with other Christians, other faiths, all men and women of good will?

• With the Anglican community (St Mary's C of E) : Christingle, Palm Sunday procession, St Luke Healing Service and Fr John Timmins' Golden Jubilee celebration in Thaxted

- In Thaxted, "Churches Together", Harvest Festival and Remembrance Sunday
- Carol services (Horham Hall)
- Easter services (Good Friday Walk of Witness, Stations of the Cross)

• Garage sale (noted as being particularly well attended and a good opportunity to welcome non-Catholics to our church and in future, join in the garage sale by providing refreshments even if there is nothing to sell)

- Tea and coffee mornings and refreshments maybe a cyber cafe?
- Lenten discussion groups involving C of E, Baptists and United Reform Church
- Parish quiz evenings
- First Communion course (reaches out to non-Catholic parents)
- Youth gatherings: FLAME @ Wembley, and World Youth Days (WYD)
- Holy Communion service at Clare and Ipswich
- Visits to Orthodox monastery at Tiptree and Stations of Cross at Clare
- Use of Anglican churches for funerals, weddings and baptisms.

b) How can your worshipping community become more immersed in the local community?

• Historically there have been good ecumenical experiences but in the last few years participation from our Catholic churches has dropped off.

• (One parishioner felt it was important to reach out to Muslims as well but was not sure how to do this and noted his/her discomfort over a guest speaker last year who may have come across as having a particular fear of Muslim persecution).

• Another parishioner noted that we have a number of mixed faith married couples, whose non-Catholic partners regularly attend Mass and support parish activities. In some cases, this has led to the non-Catholic being received in to the Church, and "this trend could be further pursued"!

7 Finances

A sustainable community must have an annual income that is sufficient to cover its expenses. There needs to be a reliable level of stewardship among the faithful who willingly give of their time, gifts and energy to sustain the work of the community.

a) How do you feel about the average weekly offertory donation in your community? Does this need to increase to enable your community to flourish in 2030?

• The level of offertories per head needed for 2030 will depend on the unknown of how many parishioners we have in 2030.

• If parishioner numbers are the same in 2030 as in 2015 then having taken into account the £16k cost to fund a priest and assuming no other significant changes to the parish we would need to increase offertories by £1 per parishioners per week plus inflation to £8.13 per week plus inflation.

b) If you are a finance-rich community, how do you feel about sharing some of your resources with very poor parts of the Diocese?

• It is unlikely that we will be cash rich for long given the list of major projects listed elsewhere on the questionnaire. Answer - Not applicable.

8 Facilities

A flourishing community needs good facilities which need to be well maintained. It cannot undertake any building projects, renovations or improvements unless it has the resources to pay for them. It may be that in some places, there is a need for a plan for the community and a plan for the buildings, and they may be separate plans. It is also true to say that our buildings can be a witness to the presence of the Church in our world, or a drain on resources and energy.

a) What sort of use can your community foresee for any unused or underused parish facilities in the future?

At Great Bardfield:-

Rooms in presbytery could be let (long or short term) and whilst respecting the Canon Law, be used for:

• Groups for arts and crafts, bridge/whist, book club, diverse music appreciation, computer literacy group, mums and toddler, knitting groups, 'Messy Church'

Counselling/ marriage care/ bereavement/ youth counselling

• Conversion as a dwelling for visiting overseas priests, or retired, convalescing priests and religious, or a retreat centre or let at a reduced rent to key workers (nurses, teachers etc one parishioner shared her very positive experience of being offered similar accommodation in a presbytery when she took on her first teaching job,) or a dwelling for a refugee family or other shelter for families requiring emergency help

• Functions (birthday parties) and once cloak rooms upstairs are upgraded perhaps the upstairs reception area could be let for functions or as a concert hall or rehearsal room if priced competitively

• The upstairs reception could also be used as a breakfast club or day cafe with discussion or prayer groups

• Gardens could be used for a garden fete, hired out for garden parties or small events or a quiet place for reflection for parishioners and community or even a car park

• One parishioner felt that in light of the uncertainty and shortage of priests there would be no point in refurbishing Our Lady's House.

At Thaxted:-

• A summer picnic in the orchard and a scheduled harvesting of apples with sale or free apples to locals being offered.

b) How can the community develop the capacity to look after its facilities in the future?

• One parishioner felt that to achieve the Super-Parish, the parish facilities should be sold to fund the building of the new Super-Parish and school.

9 Geographic Distance

A flourishing community may be influenced by its location. The proximity of neighbouring parishes can have a real impact on the vibrancy of a community. If several communities are in close proximity with large, ageing buildings that are only half-full, this will need to be taken into account when considering the future.

Our basic question is about how we can enable communities to flourish in order for us to deepen our sense of discipleship and service. Our parish churches are not private chapels maintained simply because the community has enough money to cover the expense.

a) How does your community feel about the possibility that the only way to ensure flourishing in the future is to become part of a new parish community?

• Overwhelming majority were sad, but most parishioners accepted this was inevitable due to the shortage of priests, and would find a positive outlook (with 3 exceptions, one disagreeing strongly) although the majority preference would be to carry on as we are now preserving the 'family' feel of the church and allowing our parish to grow to its full potential

• The parish should emphasise the priority to God and the similarities that we share with each other

• Several parishioners hope that the existing churches would still continue to function socially and with as many sacramental services as possible during this period of building a new parish and join alternative parishes occasionally rather than be totally shut down

• When the Thaxted church was flooded, the temporary solution of having Mass in the Anglican Church was successful and could perhaps be a permanent arrangement if the Thaxted church were to close and the same could be arranged in Bardfield

• Hope that alternative parishes are not situated at a distance too great for travel for elderly parishioners

• Feel that it is important to have small 'pockets of Catholics worshipping'

• Ensure that Children's Liturgy continues in Great Bardfield as this draws numbers

• A parish priest with regular Masses in accessible venues would be crucial to our parish's ability to flourish

• Suggestion of being organised on a deanery basis with a deanery team providing sacraments and Eucharistic Ministers filling in any absences of priests from time to time

• Ensure that if we become part of a larger parish that all those with infirmities are able to access transport to reach churches by creating a transport rota and ensuring that full communication is maintained during any process of change

• In the event of a merging of parishes, the priests involved would need to meet the new parishioners to support each other in the changes

• Hope that married priests, male and female will be accepted in the future.

b) Are there ways in which your community can serve and support neighbouring communities?

• Appeals are always well supported although more second collections could be made

• Regular contributions to food banks (starting a collection in Thaxted? Although one person thought that food bank boxes were best in the local supermarket banks) Christmas shoe boxes to be brought in and packed by children after Mass on certain Sundays, and Missio Boxes already undertaken by individuals but they could be given a boost of publicity to increase their uptake

• Forming a Samaritans' branch

• Forming a Justice and Peace Group

· Sharing a church building and the costs of supporting it

• Trade craft stall to support the third world

• Holding a bring and buy sale

· Collecting and washing duvets for the homeless

• Running a charity shop in the village to support the homeless in Braintree and running the shop with the Anglican Church

• Regular visits to the elderly and the sick could be arranged or the parish rooms on the ground floor of the church in Bardfield could be used for the elderly, lonely and for care relief

• Providing shelter to those in need

Sponsoring specific charities annually

• Providing education to equip individuals who are unable to cope with their own lives would be better than providing money and supplies creating a culture of dependency

• Inviting people (including non-Catholics) to join our Masses as a way of tackling loneliness in rural areas.

c) If applicable, what is the relationship between different churches or Mass centres within the parish or between linked parishes?

• On major feast days (Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Vigil, Christmas midnight Mass etc) the location of Mass is alternated from year to year between the Great Bardfield and Thaxted churches

• Whilst many parishioners frequent both Great Bardfield &/or Thaxted churches, it is evident that some parishioners worship more or less exclusively at one church rather than at the other or at both, apparently even on days where there is only one Mass/service available at just one or other of the two churches. This suggests that although the parish is designated as 'one parish', there is not full logistical mobility of parishioners between the two churches, even though clearly there is expectation amongst those same parishioners that the Parish Priest should be mobile enough to preside at services in both locations

• So there are two possible attitudes prevalent: on the one hand some act as if (a) we are one parish with two churches and one priest; and on the other hand some act as if (b) we are as if two parishes, each with their own church and typical regular congregations, even though sharing a priest and other resources. This relationship dynamic needs to be explored further during strategic planning

- Newsletter is shared
- Horham Hall concert and quiz nights previously attended by both parishes
- Distance between churches prevent some parishioners from frequenting the other
- Priest is shared

• Thaxted church has mostly elderly regular worshippers and Bardfield with a reception room and cloakrooms is more welcoming for families with young children (Children's Liturgy and Masses) and there is definitely a feeling that the relationship whilst cordial, is also distant and could be improved.

• More joint social activities and greater understanding of the parishioners individual faith needs would help to encourage social links and improved relations between the two churches.

 One parishioner felt that it would be difficult to defend the retention of the two separate churches for the relatively small number of parishioners.

• One church building with one Mass on a Sunday would bring the two communities together potentially increasing the talents and gifts available to be shared: with different approaches to and varieties of Liturgy, Music, social gatherings, communications all of which would be potentially "enriching rather than impoverishing".

• If one church was retained (most likely the larger of the two, Bardfield) then in the future, visiting priests from the diocese could say the Masses at the weekend and provide other pastoral services.

 A new Super-Parish would have the beneficial effect of bringing even greater numbers together and much needed mixing of the two groups of parishioners from Thaxted and Bardfield could take place regularly.

• This parishioner was upset to hear that a parishioner from Thaxted felt that they would prefer to attend the Anglican church in Thaxted rather than to attend Mass in Bardfield despite the relatively short distance between Bardfield and Thaxted.

d) Is/are there neighbouring parishes which would lend themselves to being linked to your parish or to becoming part of a partnership or "cluster"?

• Taking turns to host or co-hosting and attending mutual parish or youth events, services with Dunmow and Saffron Walden

• Holding regular meetings with neighbouring parishes to create these links

• Sharing information on retreats, missions, lectures etc as well as sharing of initiatives, resources and Liturgy groups

• Joint classes for confirmation candidates (as used to be the case with Clare)

• Having Stewards of the Gospel from other parishes attend Ginger Group meetings strengthening connections and building friendships

• Sharing priests for Masses and supporting each other for cover during absences

• A 'super parish' could be formed with a link to Saffron Walden and a new school built to accommodate the over-subscribed Catholic primary school in Saffron Walden

• One parishioner did not want to form a partnership with another parish and another worried that attending meetings to form a partnership could hinder the parish from tackling its own problems.

• Another parishioner thought the idea was "horrendous"!

• One parishioner felt that if one of our neighbouring parishes (preferably Saffron Walden relocating with St Thomas More to an out of town site that was close to Thaxted and accessible by Bardfield) relocated to a new larger state of the art building, we would benefit from being linked to such a facility and could join them.

10 Young People

Young people are not just the 'future' of the Church; they are very much part of the present. We all need to look at how actively young people are encouraged and affirmed in their contribution to the community throughout the year. The enthusiasm and energy of young people can sometimes be daunting to those who are older, but they are also signs of the Holy Spirit within us and among us.

a) What good experiences regarding Church life do the young people have in your community?

• Previous attendance at World Youth Day and sharing of their experiences encourages the young (offer sponsorship to other younger members to attend future events)

• Certain young people have attended retreats (eg Youth 2000, Celebrate, New Dawn) but not through the Church

- Children's Liturgy and good interaction with Fr Richard
- Fundraising events (e.g. Challenge during confirmation preparation, 'Sunny Day Bags')
- Coffee Mornings (with children providing the baking after each Children's Mass)
- Children's Masses Christ the King and Nativity Mass
- First Holy Communion Preparation (query whether the children and their parents continue to practise their faith after they have received their First Holy Communion)
- Families are made to feel welcome and are encouraged to read, serve and take part in Mass
- Altar servers
- Children's play area in the reception for parents to relax with their children

b) How can the presence and witness of young people be more encouraged and supported in the community?

• Holding youth services or discussion groups with other parishes in our Deanery (approach existing youth gospel groups in the diocese or St John Payne)

• Starting a Youth Ministry for young adults (20s and 30s)

- Guild of St Stephen for altar servers to show their commitment is appreciated
- Encouraging younger readers
- Inviting younger members of the congregation to collect hymn and Mass books
- Inviting children age 10+ to help with coffee mornings
- 'Messy Church' for 3 11 year olds, with parental supervision, focussing on the Gospel messages
- Prayer groups for 11+ and young adults

• Social gatherings for youth 13+? (perhaps in the homes of parishioners or holding an open air concert in our parish?)

• Youth page in our newsletter and display photos of relevant learning experiences in the back of their church as well as at their schools

- Visits from other young inspiring people
- Creating a 'COOL Club' (Catechism of Our Lord) for young teens

• Providing a question box for anonymous faith questions that could be answered in a homily from Fr Richard

• Youth Mass (readers and Eucharistic ministry taken on by the youth) with more uplifting songs and provision of children's order of Mass and activity sheets for the very young

- Inviting parents with young families to join the parish council meetings or send them a specific questionnaire
- Demonstrating that the teachings and activities of the church are relevant to the young

 Encouraging young people to be informed of Catholic Youth activities and the Deanery Day for children and families and encouraging teenagers to express themselves so they have a desire to be confirmed

• If a church is geographically close to a school, there may be a better relationship between the teenager and the parish and minimises any embarrassment or fear of being mocked or bullied for going to church

• Ensuring transport is available (at parish cost) to take young people to events (young people's retreats) rather than relying on parents having to do this

• By "word of mouth" inviting new young people to come to our churches

• Setting up an area for young families in the back of Thaxted church with a sofa, toys and books was suggested

• One parishioner suggested that faced with young people having a "different attention span and need for stimulation" and the "speed and quality of their receptivity to media stimulus" far outpacing the Mass experience in its current form, there was a necessity to "re-invent the Mass experience". This could be fixed by specialists in media - storytelling, drama - without losing the plot, and without losing reverence, and without trivialising or making sensational the sacrament of the Mass." This parishioner fears disengagement by young people otherwise

 In addition, the role of the priest should be re-examined to establish to what extent ordination needs to be questioned and to ensure the life style of the priest becomes more dynamic, interesting, contemporary and engaging to attract more vocations

11 What Else?

a) Given all the findings you have explored in Part A of this questionnaire, what would you see as the priorities to ensure a viable and flourishing community in 2030?

• We should encourage everyone to read a new form of the newsletter (to be circulated to the housebound) which should contain information about all parish matters (including finances, future projects, liturgical events) and the Ginger Group, highlighting points of interests; Mass times, liturgical groups, contact numbers

• We should encourage more members of the Ginger Group and continue to make it known that it is an open group for all

• One parishioner felt that Stewardship could only be effective if the notion of gratitude, giving back and generosity underpinned who we are as a community and should therefore be manifest at every Sunday Mass and in all daily activities

• One parishioner felt very lucky to be able to attend Mass so near to home and to have such kind and helpful fellow parishioners

• Another parishioner felt that having a church close to her home with regular worship and contact with parishioners meant that her daughter's faith was strengthened and grew from the example of all those living their faith in close proximity

• It was noted by several that the Parish Council needs to advertise that they need new members and give details of AGMs well in advance

• We could offer more wider reaching services with a positive attitude to spirituality rather than repentance

• We could be more welcoming to newcomers and one parishioner feels that no-one feels interested in getting to know anyone else in the parish other than those they already know well

• We could be less afraid of making a suggestion lest we are expected to organise them but equally be more forthcoming in volunteering

• We could be more sociable before and after Mass and at the Coffee Mornings

• The sick list should be more than names on a list and there should be organised visits to the homes of the sick by all parishioners

b) Do you have any other observations - particularly about anything we have missed?

• We need clarification from Brentwood on the outcomes of the questionnaires to reassure those who may have become despondent and unsure about the future of our church

• How can we encourage our male youth to dedicate themselves to God and the priesthood? (Perhaps a question for Pope Francis!)

• Being involved in community events which are not specifically for celebration or worship but for fundraising helps to raise community morale and benefits everyone

• So many adults have such a reluctant and distorted perception of the sacrament of Confession, it is important that young people are helped to understand it right.

• The Church's greatest resources –the sacraments, pilgrimages, works of mercy, not to mention so many treasures of culture – are Her most human. The same spirit should inform the pastoral approach to young people, especially when so much confusion is set about us.

• And groups for young people should not be too pious – so I don't recommend prayer and scripture study; we must be human before we can really become Christian, and groups for the young should be directed towards the business of virtuous human living, 'life in abundance' in a way that is not choked by piety. That additionally will equip the young better for dealing with non-Christian peers.

• Could some of the teenagers become mentors for the children after they have made their first Holy Communion and indeed expanding on the idea of mentors, have youth and young adult mentors who would have senior mentors who themselves would be mentored by Fr Richard. These mentors would pray for you if you wanted them to

• Could the positive information provided in the previous survey be incorporated into this survey?

• The updated Alpha course might have a wide appeal as it encourages social interaction and includes a testimony from Bear Grylls

• Fr Richard is an excellent communicator and has the ability to relate to young and old and all the volunteers are very much appreciated and new and more volunteers should be encouraged to step forward and take part in the next stages of the parish's development

• One Thaxted parishioner would not support sharing the chapel in Thaxted with any other denomination and would rather worship in Saffron Walden if the church in Thaxted was to close down

• One parishioner felt that the questionnaire was totally irrelevant to us as the only problem facing our parishes both of which have a very close knit congregation, "is the fear of not having a parish priest when Fr Richard can no longer look after us."

• "Will we still have cake day?" Was the concern of Freddie!

• The lighting in Great Bardfield could be improved to make it less gloomy on darker days

• On improvements to Thaxted church, a suggestion that a box of blankets was available for elderly people to keep warm when the heating had failed and for more social events (wine tasting, pub quiz and supper fund raising).

12 Good Practice

There is no doubt that there are some really innovative things going on within our worshipping communities from Parish Fun Days which bring together the whole community to imaginative liturgies during Holy Week; from exciting Confirmation programmes to pilgrimages and vigils.

a) Is there something your community is involved in which will be of interest to others in the Diocese? *Please use as much space as you need.*

It would be impossible to identify and select how and why 'the Spirit moves' in a special way in our parish, but we could imagine the following three selected aspects are representative of the many varied ways we feel our parish is indeed special, and where we could imagine these features of our parish life and organisation are in some way 'exceptional' in as far as they might be different from other parishes, and perhaps therefore of interest to other parishes:-

• **Ginger Group** is the parish response to leading and managing change, which was a kind of precursor to the Stewards of the Gospel initiative. This is an open group of people, convened by Fr Richard, chaired by a lay parish member, and meeting regularly. This group now comprises the parish response to SotG. It is well attended by a broad cross-section of the parish, voluntary and energised. It provides a collective approach to the change agenda, which no single person in our parish has felt able to commit to as a Steward.

• The Children's Liturgy Group: this serves both churches by providing liturgically oriented catechism from the opening hymn at Sunday 9.15am Great Bardfield Mass through to their offertory procession and presentation of work to the priest, who welcomes the children and responds with a small interactive teaching for them. This runs every week. It receives warm, enthusiastic and loyal support from parents, both in our parish, and also attracting families from neighbouring parishes, who say they are missing something equivalent in their own parish, and find themselves very welcome and engaged at our parish. The upper floor rear of Great Bardfield premises provides an outstandingly suitable location for the Children's Liturgy Group, and over the years this venue has been adapted, decorated, styled, livened up, to give the feel of a special dedicated space suiting these activities. The availability of the kitchen and toilets on hand make this a highly workable arrangement. The activities now extend to 'Children's Masses' four times a year (eg. Youth Sunday/Christ the King; Mother's Day/Laetare Sunday/ Annunciation; Corpus Christi; Harvest Sunday; plus a Christmas Nativity Tableau).

• Monthly Coffee Mornings: these are held after the 9.15am Sunday Mass at Great Bardfield, the first Sunday of each month – and sometimes additional Sundays, depending on feast days. Parishioners stay to mingle and enjoy the selection of home baking that inevitably supports the event. There are two teams of ladies who alternate the running of these events, and are always well attended. They provide a much-welcomed forum for parishioners to socialise, and get to know each other better. The upgrading of a super new kitchen at Great Bardfield makes this feature of parish life even more attractive for all!

Our Parish Community's Initial Thoughts and Ideas about the Future

Based upon the wide consultation and reflection that has taken place in completing parts A and B of this questionnaire, please use this section to provide an indication of your parish community's initial thoughts about its future. You are also asked to provide information about the consultation process that has taken place to inform these views.

a) Our initial thoughts and ideas

Based on everything you have prayerfully and carefully considered so far please set out below the initial thoughts and ideas from your community about the way forward for your parish. You may also wish to provide a view about anything that is emerging regarding the ability of your parish to flourish into the future – either on its own or in conjunction with another community.

Ideas for the Future:

1. We feel that to raise the profile of our Church we should encourage the existing strong community to strengthen their faith by encouraging study and prayer groups for adults as well as social interaction for all, including the youth and to be even more welcoming to all Christians and non-Christians, of all ages in our community. There have been many practical proposals for specific events which have received a lot of support and could be implemented.

2. We believe that more volunteers can be trained to carry on some of the existing roles and for future Stewards of the Gospel and other lay leaders to take on roles that the shortage of priests will necessitate. Our parishioners have "hidden resources" and they will be encouraged to contribute more by existing volunteers.

3. While Confirmation Classes will start in October 2017, there is strong support in future for regular prayer groups, scripture study and discussion groups as well as "Godly Play" or "Messy Church" groups to encourage children in their faith. There is also interest in family retreats. We are improving our communication of youth Masses to schools and school Masses at our church and will have a new form of newsletter and an improved website to share information on events. We are also planning to hold an event open to all, called for by Brendan Cox, widower of the late Jo Cox MP, as part of the "Great Get Together" on 18 June 2017.

4. We currently have rooms in the presbytery which could be let as flats or as rooms for long or short term use to provide income to enable us to look after the fabric of the Church and use all facilities wisely to enhance and make welcoming our parish to the community in which we worship. The rooms could also be used by visiting overseas priests, or retired, convalescing priests and religious.

5. Looking towards 2030, there is enthusiasm for the creation of a "North Essex Super-Parish" uniting the parishes of Saffron Walden, Great Dunmow and Thaxted/Great Bardfield with a new church, school and community facilities to build and strengthen our future communities. We are concerned however that any alternative parishes are not situated at a distance too great for travel for the elderly and busy families and we would like to ensure that all those with infirmities are able to access transport to reach churches by creating a transport rota.

6. We are considering extending links with schools and giving them a voice on the parish website to extend youth participation in a variety of activities in parish life. We are also keen to ensure transport is available (at parish cost) to take young people from surrounding parishes to events such as young people's retreats. The role of the priest is crucial in making young people feel welcome and engaging with them. Maybe BRES could offer advice and training for priests who lack confidence talking to young people. How can we encourage our male youth to dedicate themselves to God and the priesthood? (Perhaps a question for Pope Francis!) cont'd....

Our initial thoughts and ideas (continued)

7. We currently have a growing number of people who choose to come to our parish for various reasons as well as families coming regularly for the Children's Liturgy and First Holy Communion and Confirmation Preparation and we would be happy to welcome anyone from neighbouring parishes.

8. We have extended our contacts through the Ginger Group and Stewards of the Gospel from other parishes have attended our meetings, strengthening connections and building friendships. We continue to have Deanery meetings (NEDPC) through choice in order to maintain contacts and this works well.

9. Overall the majority of the parish are keen to keep our vibrant and active community; we would welcome other parishes to join us whether in our existing geographically centrally located churches, or a newly built parish centre.

10 We would also welcome clarification from Brentwood on the outcomes of questionnaires to reassure those who may have become despondent and unsure about the future of our Church.

b) The Consultation Process
